One of our goals is to make sure that every pupils' reading improves.

Here's how

 Please ensure that they read as often as possible to a grown up – and that their reading record is signed.

There will be prizes for the pupils who have read the most each half term

- If they read something different, a newspaper or a magazine for example, write it in their reading record.
 It's still reading....and that's a good thing!
- They only need read a page or two
 Reading mustn't be a horrid thing that they have to do little and often is best.
- Your child doesn't have to read "hard" books. Struggling with a book with many unknown words is pointless. It is better to keep to easier books to build their confidence.
 'Nothing succeeds like success'
- Always talk to your child about their book; about the pictures, the characters, how they think the story will end, their favourite part.
 You will then be able to see how well they have understood and you will help them to develop good comprehension skills.
- Make reading an enjoyable experience. Sit with your child. Try not to put pressure on them
 if they are reluctant or tired.

If your child loses interest then do something else, or try at a different time of the day.

• Be positive, don't say 'No. That's wrong,' but 'Let's read it together' and point to the words as you say them.

Boost your child's confidence with constant praise for even the smallest achievement.
